The C.G. Jung Institute of the Pacific Northwest

The C.G. Jung Institute of the Pacific Northwest is a non-profit educational institution affiliated with the Pacific Northwest Society of Jungian Analysts. The society was formed in 1982 and officially recognized in 1986 as a group member of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP).

The Institute provides an analytic training program committed to both the development and professional practice of Jung's Analytical Psychology. The faculty is composed of analysts with a variety of backgrounds and training in analytical psychology at institutes in the United States and abroad. They bring to the program the full range of perspectives – classical, archetypal and developmental – in the contemporary world of Analytical Psychology.

Guiding Philosophy

The guiding philosophy of the program is to help qualified and dedicated individuals cultivate a relationship with that deeper aspect of their core nature which Jung defined as the Self and to develop a body of theoretical knowledge and clinical skills leading to certification as a Jungian Analyst. This philosophy emphasizes the development of the whole person through the individuation process. Candidates are encouraged to find and refine an embodied way of working with the psyche from the inside out both personally and professionally.

The program requires acquiring a body of knowledge through seminars and supervision and assesses competencies through exams and papers. However, the structures and tasks in the program aim to serve each candidate's development of a deeper experience of him or herself. This value is the source of inspiration for this program and for those involved with it.

The Analytic Training Program

The program begins February 1, 2011. Thereafter, primary elements of the program such as seminars and group supervision will be organized around the academic year.

The program has three domains: individuation, content, and practice. It seeks to foster an in-depth integration of the three domains in the candidate in the service of empathic and effective personal, community and therapeutic relationships.

Individuation: This domain addresses the individuation process which is central to Jung's work and this program as discussed above. The personal analysis is the bedrock of a candidate's psychological development. The program also provides for an individual mentoring committee which serves as a container for discussion and guidance of the unique interests and needs of each candidate throughout the training program. The individual mentoring committee will meet with the candidate at the start of the program and at regular intervals thereafter to create and revise an individual learning agreement which guides each candidate's training experience.

Content: The content domain encompasses the principles of Jungian theory and develops familiarity with the Collected Works and related literature. Content will be primarily provided by a series of five-week and weekend seminars over three years leading to the advanced candidacy exam. Seminars will be based in Portland, but some weekend seminars will require out of town travel. Seminars provide contact with different analysts who bring their own relationships to Jungian ideas as well as providing a place for the candidates to interact, to learn in groups and form a cohort.

The curriculum includes seminars on such topics as:

- Fundamentals of Analytical Psychology
- Theory of Complexes
- Archetypes and the Collective Unconscious
- Mythology
- Dreams
- Fairy Tales
- Transference and Countertransference
- The Body in Analysis

The seminars interweave ideas, inner experience and human exchange.

Practice: The practice domain addresses the capacity to access and use conscious and unconscious levels of the psyche when working with oneself and with clients. Embodied practice refers to the integration of the candidate's inner and outer life as demonstrated by the capacity to be present in a felt relationship with others. This domain emphasizes skills such as empathic use of the candidate's inner perceptions, working with complexes and transference and countertransference, and the skilled use of symbolic material. The development of clinical skills will be the focus of individual and group supervision which are required throughout the program but which receive intensified focus after passage of the advanced candidacy exam.



Program Overview

The program is comprised of three stages. The preliminary candidacy stage lasts for the first year. This is followed by the candidacy stage which culminates with passage of the advanced candidacy exam. Third is the advanced candidacy stage which emphasizes clinical work and ends with the successful completion of the case exam, thesis or final project and the awarding of the diploma.

The program components are:

- Individual analysis.
- Individual and group supervision.
- An individual mentoring committee
- A series of seminars on Jungian theory and application
- A monthly process group.
- Assessment of competencies in individual development, theoretical content, and practice.
- A thesis or final project.

Applicant Qualifications

Prerequisites for application to the Analytic Training Program:

- Complete at least 150 hours of personal analysis with one or more IAAP analyst(s).
- Have a degree in a mental health discipline, such as a Ph.D. in clinical, counseling or pastoral psychology, an M.D. with a completed residency in psychiatry, or a Masters Degree in clinical social work or counseling psychology.
- Be licensed or certified to practice psychotherapy in the state where one is practicing during training.
- Show proof of having at least \$1,000,000 - \$3,000,000 professional liability insurance which must be maintained throughout training.
- Have completed at least 2,000 hours of supervised, clinical work acceptable to the training committee.
- Be currently engaged in a professional psychotherapy practice.

Application Procedures

Applications must be received by May 10, 2010

To apply, one must submit the following:

- A completed application form (download form from pnsja.com)
- A non-refundable application fee of \$300.00
- A letter from the applicant's analyst(s) stating the time period and number of analytic hours
- An academic transcript from the institution(s) granting a graduate degree
- A description and evaluation of clinical work from at least 2 clinical supervisor(s)
- A copy of the current professional license
- A completed and signed agreement and waiver form (download form from pnsja.com)

The training committee will review the applications, select individuals to be interviewed, and send notifications with additional information about scheduling interviews.

Graduation & Certification Requirements

To be eligible to graduate, the candidate must fulfill the learning agreement, pass the examinations, and complete the thesis or final project. The candidate must receive satisfactory supervisory reports, pay all fees, and receive approval for graduation from the mentoring and training committees.

The candidate must also complete a minimum of:

- 400 hours of personal analysis
- 120 hours of individual supervision with at least 2 analysts
- 120 hours of group supervision
- Regular participation in the process group

Fees

Current fees are:

Application:	\$300
Interviews:	\$600*
Annual Tuition:	\$5000 - \$6000 **
Advanced Candidacy Exam:	\$600
Case Assessment Exam:	\$600
Thesis or Final Project Discussion:	\$300

* Interview fee covers six hours of interviews.

**Tuition includes seminars, process group and group supervision fees. Tuition may vary according to the number of candidates enrolled.

Fees for personal analysis will be determined by the candidate and the analyst. The fee for individual supervision with CGJIPN analysts is set at \$110 per hour. A candidate must keep current with all fees to advance or graduate.

The Analytic Training Program is governed by the Administrative Policies of the C.G. Jung Institute Pacific Northwest. These policies should be read prior to applying to the program. They may be found on the website at pnsja.com.
